2017 Product Calendar

The U.S. Census Bureau has posted anticipated release dates for each regular and recurring statistical product scheduled for release in [2017](#). These products are listed in the Census Bureau's [online product calendar](#), which is updated as needed throughout the year.

American Community Survey

2016 American Community Survey

Statistics on numerous demographic, social, economic and housing characteristics, including language spoken at home, educational attainment, commute to work, employment, mortgage status and rent, as well as income, poverty and health insurance coverage will be available. Statistics will be available for all geographic areas with populations of 65,000 or more. Embargo subscribers will have access to these statistics beginning at noon EDT, Tuesday, Sept. 12, for release at 12:01 a.m., Thursday, Sept. 14.

Demographic

2016 Current Population Survey Fertility Table Package

The U.S. Census Bureau will release the 2016 Current Population Survey fertility table package, which includes fertility data for women ages 15 to 50. The tables show measures of childlessness and children ever born to women by demographic characteristics. (Tentatively scheduled for release May 2.)

Voting and Registration in the Election of November 2016

The Census Bureau will release a table package from the Voting and Registration Supplement to the Current Population Survey for the November 2016 election, which surveys the civilian noninstitutionalized population in the United States. This table package provides data of the electorate with a focus on patterns of voter turnout by race, Hispanic origin, age and other demographic characteristics and how they have changed over the years. (Scheduled for release May 10.)

Subcounty Population Estimates: July 1, 2016

Internet tables showing annual population estimates of the nation's incorporated places and minor civil divisions — cities, towns, townships, villages and boroughs — since the 2010 Census and up to July 1, 2016, as well as rankings based on population growth. (Embargo starting at 10 a.m. EDT on Tuesday, May 23, for public release at 12:01 a.m. EDT on Thursday, May 25.)

Income and Poverty in the United States: 2016

On Sept. 12, the Census Bureau will announce findings from its annual official report on income and poverty for the nation based on the Annual Social and Economic Supplement to the 2017 Current Population Survey. The report will include statistics pertaining to the 2016 calendar year and will also compare trends over time. (Scheduled for release Sept. 12.)

Health Insurance in the United States: 2016

On Sept. 12, the Census Bureau will announce its findings on health insurance coverage. The report will include national-level statistics from the Social and Economic Supplement to the 2017 Current Population Survey and some national and state-level statistics from the American Community Survey. It will include data from the 2016 calendar year and compare it with previous years. (Scheduled for release Sept. 12.)

2020 Census Quarterly Program Management Review

2016 Current Population Survey Split Panel Test

April 25 — The Census Bureau has released [research files](#) and a [paper](#) [PDF <1.0 MB] based on the March [split-panel test](#) of the Current Population Survey. The split-panel test included the traditional health insurance questions asked prior to the 2014 Current Population Survey Annual Social and Economic Supplement.

Estimates of U.S. Population by Age and Sex: April 1, 2010, to July 1, 2016

April 19 — What does it mean to be a young adult? Today's young adults look different from prior generations in almost every regard: how much education they have, their work experiences, when they start a family, and even who they live with while growing up. 2015 County Business Patterns

April 20 — These statistics provide the only detailed annual information on the number of establishments, employment during the week of March 12, first quarter payroll, and annual payroll for nearly 1,200 industries covered at the U.S. level and by state, county, metropolitan area, ZIP code and congressional district levels. These data are useful for studying the economic activity of small areas; analyzing economic changes over time; and as a benchmark for other statistical series, surveys and databases between economic censuses. 2015 ZIP Code Business Patterns

April 20 — Provides data on the number of business establishments by employment-size class for detailed industries. Statistics are provided for about 40,000 ZIP codes nationwide and include the total number of establishments, employment and payroll for more than 40,000 five-digit ZIP code areas nationwide. In addition, the number of establishments for nine employment-size categories is provided by detailed industry for each ZIP code. Annual Survey of State Government Tax Collections: 2016

April 18 — Provides a summary of taxes collected by state for five broad tax categories and up to 25 tax subcategories. These statistics include measurement of tax by category: property tax, sales and gross receipts taxes, license taxes, income taxes and other taxes. Each tax category is broken down into subcategories (e.g., motor fuel sales, alcoholic beverage sales, motor vehicle licenses, alcoholic beverage licenses, etc.).
